Description

A set of 6 antique Victorian Vanity Fair framed prints dating from 1891-1903 depicting men from the legal profession; judges, barristers, and QCs. Beautifully mounted and glazed in antique oak frames with inner gilt slip, these antique prints are a good collection to bring a little satirical humour to your wall. Vanity Fair was a weekly magazine published in Britain from 1868 to 1914 and offered a satirical take on Victorian society, publishing articles on fashion, current events and the latest scandals. A full-page colour lithograph caricature of a contemporary celebrity or dignitary appeared in most issues, and it is for these caricatures that Vanity Fair is best known today. The primary artists were Carlo Pellegrini "Ape" and Leslie Ward "Spy", and it is because of the latter artist as to why these prints are often collectively referred to as "Spy Prints". This set of 6 includes: "Mr Attorney" a caricature portrait of Robert Reid, 1st Earl Loreburn; British lawyer, judge and radical Liberal politician (1846-1923). Published on 10th January 1895 in Vanity Fair. By artist Leslie Ward "Spy". "Vicar General" A caricature portrait of Charles Alfred Cripps, later 1st Baro...
