Description

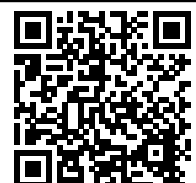
An unusual silver mounted dry mustard from the reign of King George IV. These rare and interesting items were used on the Georgian dining table for holding dry mustard (as opposed to the more commonly found 'made' mustard - a condiment that along with other spices, such as cayenne and cinnamon were used in dry form. This lovely example has a cylindrical body with cut and rounded lobes. To the base is a polished pontil mark. The silver mount has a band of reeding to the rim and a hinged lid, with steeple finial to the top. A hallmarked long handled mustard spoon of similar date is also included.
